Dear First Selectman Del Monaco:

The Ad Hoc Housing Opportunities Committee has been meeting monthly since we were appointed in May, 2022, to develop strategies for affordable housing opportunities.

Initially our work has focused on educating ourselves about the housing "landscape" by hosting the Chair of Ridgefield's Affordable Housing Commission, Dave Goldenberg, the Director of CT's Department of Housing, Michael Santoro, and WestCOG's Planner, Kristin Floberg.

At this juncture we wish to engage the New Fairfield community in the process, as it relates to their experience and/or perceptions of housing. Developing an accurate assessment of our housing stock will take place as well. In the future, we may be able to secure grant money, however at present the committee is requesting the financial support of the Board of Selectmen to kickstart the process now.

Researching knowledgeable consultants, we hope to enlist Jocelyn Ayers, Director of Litchfield County Housing Opportunities, who has worked with 16 municipalities over the last two years to develop and adopt municipal housing affordability plans. In addition Jocelyn is closely associated with Fairfield County's Center for Housing Opportunity. As provided in the attached consultation proposal, her fee for this stage of the work is estimated to be \$7000. We are asking the Board of Selectmen to make this amount available for the Committee to use this Fiscal Year for surveys and community forums.

On behalf of our committee, we thank you for considering our request.

#### Introduction

Jocelyn Ayer, Director of the Litchfield County Center for Housing Opportunity (LC-CHO) has worked with sixteen (16) municipalities over the last two years to develop and adopt municipal housing affordability plans as required by CGS 8-30j. These municipalities ranged in size from the Town of Warren (pop. 1,350) to the City of Torrington (pop.35,000). No matter the size of the town, the critically important ingredient in these planning processes has been engaging the community in an ongoing way.

Jocelyn would be happy to assist/advise the New Fairfield Housing Opportunities Committee with their work in the ways described in the proposed scope of work below. The new Director of the Fairfield County Center for Housing Opportunity, Aisha Woods would also hope to join in on meetings as she gets to know the housing goals of each Fairfield County town.

# Proposed Scope of Work

- Assist the committee with developing and distributing one or more resident surveys; including a housing needs survey. (CHO has a SurveyMonkey subscription already and could host New Fairfield's online survey as it has done with the other towns it has worked with at no additional cost to the town.)
- Assist the committee with developing community forum agendas, outreach, and attend forums to answer resident questions as needed that may arise at public forums.
- Assist the committee to provide targeted survey and housing data for use by New Fairfield's decision-making bodies.
- Prepare reports, flyers, or executive summaries as needed for community forums, posting on the town's website, or to provide to the New Fairfield decision-making bodies.

This work could begin as soon as November 15, 2022. With this scope of work it is hard to estimate the exact time; therefore I propose we do an "up to" amount of hours the New Fairfield Ad Hoc Housing Opportunities Committee would actually need. We could provide up to 75 hours for a cost of \$7000.

# DIVISION 5. - FIREFIGHTERS, EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS, PARAMEDICS AND AMBULANCE DRIVERS

Sec. 16-91. - Tax abatement for volunteers pursuant to section 6 of Public Act 99-272. CGS Sec. 12-81W.

(a)

*Preamble.* The town hereby establishes a program of tax abatement for real and motor vehicle property taxes, pursuant to Section 6 of Public Act 99-272 CGS Sec. 12-81W and further subject to the provisions hereof, for any fiscal year for any eligible person who volunteers his or her services as a firefighter, emergency medical technician, paramedic or ambulance driver.

(b)

Definitions.

Volunteer means each qualified member of the New Fairfield Volunteer Fire Department ("NFVFD") or member of the fire police as certified to by the program administrator for the NFVFD, who volunteers his or her services as a firefighter, fire police, emergency medical technician, paramedic or ambulance driver ("volunteer").

Certification date means October 1 of each year.

Certification form shall mean a form prescribed by the tax collector of the town for certification of eligibility for real and motor vehicle property tax abatement.

(c)

Eligibility. A volunteer shall establish eligibility for the benefits described herein by performing a suitable level of volunteer service to the NFVFD. That level of service shall be determined by the program administrator of the NFVFD. In order to be eligible for a tax abatement in any fiscal year, in addition to any other eligibility requirements, a volunteer firefighter must not be delinquent in any tax obligation to the town.

(d)

Benefit. An eligible volunteer shall be entitled to an abatement of real or motor vehicle property taxes for any fiscal year during which they are deemed eligible pursuant to the provisions hereof in accordance with subsection (e) hereof. An inactive member, having served twenty-five (25) years or more of active service to the NFVFD, shall be eligible to receive a tax abatement of real or motor vehicle property taxes annually in the amount of seven hundred fifty fifteen hundred dollars (\$750.00) (\$1,500.00). A "Line of Duty" death will qualify the volunteer's spouse to continue to receive an abatement of real or motor vehicle property taxes for a period of ten (10) years at the volunteer's

current level of tax abatement, so long as the real or motor vehicle property is owned by the volunteer's spouse (pursuant to section 10 of Public Act 00-215). Tax abatement shall be applied first against any real property taxes and if volunteer doesn't own real property, then against motor vehicle taxes. Notwithstanding subsection (e) hereof, no volunteer shall receive an abatement greater than one two thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) (\$2,000.00) in any fiscal year nor greater than the volunteer's real or motor vehicle property tax liability in any fiscal year. The abatement may not be carried over into another fiscal year. (Example: Volunteer eligible for abatement of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) in fiscal year 2000, with a tax liability of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00), may not carry over the two hundred dollars (\$200.00) unused portion of the abatement into subsequent fiscal years.)

(e)

Service point system. The program administrator of NFVFD shall track the participation of service of its members with respect to years of service, past and present, and current level of service. The service point system and the amount of abatement shall be as follows:

Service Point System

#### **EXPAND**

Years of Service	Tax Abatement
0—1	\$0.00
2—4	\$ <del>500.00</del> -\$1,000.00
5—9	<del>\$750.00</del> -\$1,500.00
10 and over	\$ <del>1,000.00</del> -\$2,000.00

(f)

Certification. Each year on or after the certification date the program administrator of NFVFD, together with the volunteer seeking the abatement, shall certify to the tax collector, on a certification form, that the volunteer is eligible for benefits hereunder. On or before December 31 st of each year, the program administrator of the NFVFD shall forward the certification form to the tax collector attesting to the eligibility of each volunteer for benefits hereunder. Copies of the certification form shall be forwarded to the director of finance, the tax assessor, the first selectman and the chief of the NFVFD and shall be available for public inspection at the NFVFD headquarters.

(g)

Jointly owned property. If real property is jointly owned by one (1) or more eligible volunteers, an abatement shall be given to each volunteer at the abatement amount established by subsection (e).

(h)

Recapture and termination. On the sale, conveyance or transfer of the volunteer's real or motor vehicle property or portion thereof, the abatement shall be prorated by the tax collector for the actual days of ownership by the volunteer. On the death of a volunteer, the abatement shall apply only through the end of the fiscal year in which the death occurs, unless it is a "Line of Duty Death".

(i)

Appeal. Any volunteer who claims to have been wrongly denied benefits hereunder may, within forty-five (45) days of written notice to the volunteer of his or her denial of eligibility, appeal to the board of selectmen of the Town of New Fairfield for redress, with a copy of such appeal to be sent to the program administrator. The decision of the board of selectmen with respect to each such appeal shall be final.

(j)

Miscellaneous. The volunteer shall be responsible for any federal and state tax consequences that may result from any abatement the volunteer receives under this division. The town shall file any documents that may be required by state or federal agencies for the abatement, however, neither the filing of documents nor any other action by the town pursuant to this division shall create or imply any type of employment or beneficiary status between the town and volunteer.

(k)

Applicability. The program shall be applicable to assessment years commencing on or after October 1, 2018 2021 and to any volunteer who is eligible as of October 1, 2018 2021.

ARTICLE II. - DOGS

Sec. 2.5-16. - Definitions.

For purposes of this article, the word "street" shall mean any public or private street, road or highway, whether or not paved.

Sec. 2.5-17. - Prohibited conduct.

No person owning, keeping or having custody of any dog shall permit such dog on any property of a person other than the owner, keeper or custodian of such animal or on any street or sidewalk, unless such animal is accompanied by such owner, keeper or custodian and is firmly under the control of such owner, keeper or custodian, either by:

- (1) Being on a leash held by such owner, keeper or custodian; or
- Being inside an enclosure.

Sec. 2.5-18. - Impoundment.

- (a) The regional Animal Control Officer may take into custody any animal found not accompanied by its owner, keeper or custodian in violation of this article and shall impound such dog at the regional animal control shelter. Such regional Animal Control Officer shall immediately notify the owner, keeper or custodian of any dog so taken, if known, of its impoundment. If the owner, keeper or custodian of any such dog is unknown, such regional animal control officer shall immediately tag or employ such other suitable means of identification of such dog as may be approved by the chief canine control officer of the state and shall promptly cause a description of such dog to be published once in the lost and found column of a newspaper having a circulation in the town.
- (b) If such dog is not claimed by and released to the owner, keeper or custodian within seven (7) days after the date of publication, the regional Animal Control Officer, upon finding such dog to be in satisfactory health, may sell such dog to any person who satisfies the regional Animal Control Officer that he is purchasing it as a pet and that he can give it a good home and proper care. The regional animal control officer may retain possession of such dog for such additional period of time as he may deem advisable in order to place such dog as a pet or surrender such dog to an animal shelter. If, within such period, any dog is not claimed by and released to the owner, keeper or custodian or purchased as a pet, the regional animal control officer shall cause such dog to be mercifully killed by a licensed veterinarian or disposed of as the state veterinarian may direct.
- (c) Any dog taken into custody or impounded pursuant to this article shall be redeemed by the owner, keeper or custodian thereof, or the agent of such owner, keeper or custodian, upon proper identification and payment by such owner, keeper or custodian or his agent of the sum of (1) fifteen dollars (\$15.00) and (2) the cost of advertising incurred under the provisions of subsection (b) above. When the owner, keeper or custodian of any such impounded dog fails to redeem such dog within twenty-four (24) hours after receiving notification so to do, or where the owner, keeper or custodian was unknown within twenty-four (24) hours after notification was effected by means of publication in a newspaper, such owner, keeper or custodian shall pay, in addition to such redemption fee and the cost of advertising, the full cost of detention and care of such impounded dog. All of the above redemption fees are in addition to any fines that may have been levied pursuant to section 2.5-19 of this article. In addition, any owner, keeper or custodian of any such impounded dog who fails to redeem such dog within one hundred twenty (120) hours after receiving notification so to do shall have committed a violation of this article.

Sec. 2.5-19. - Penalties.

Any person who violates this article shall, for the first offense, be issued a written warning, for the second offense be fined not more than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), and for the third and each subsequent offense be fined not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

Sec. 2.5-20. - Enforcement.

Enforcement of this article rests with the regional animal control officers.

(Ord. of 3-31-92, § 5)

Sec. 2.5-21. - Appeal.

Any person who is cited for a violation of this article may appeal to the Board of Selectmen within thirty (30) days after the issuance of a Notice of Violation by the regional Animal Control Officer, by giving written notice thereof to the Board of Selectmen. The Board of Selectmen shall, within thirty (30) days of their receipt of a written notice of appeal, consider and act on the appeal. The Board of Selectmen shall give the accused violator written notice of the date, place and time in which the Board of Selectmen will hear his or her appeal, and the accused violator shall have the right to be present at such time and to present and cross-examine witnesses. The Board of Selectmen shall issue its decision on the appeal within fifteen (15) days of the time it considers the appeal and shall give written notice of its decision to the accused violator.
